The school's Progress 8 score for 2024 of +0.44, places it at the top of the league table for secondary schools across Shropshire. Progress 8 is a Department for Education measure that reflects the academic progress that pupils have made, from Primary School to the end of their time in Secondary.

Head of School, Andy Wood said to us, "Our pupils' achievements are a testament to their determination and the relentless support from our teachers and staff. We are incredibly proud of everyone involved."



Church Stretton School kindly hosted the event again. The students started the day with a Team building exercise organised by Mr Jew, where our primary students worked with the secondary students to compete against each other. All were energised and ready to start the Student Parliament activities.

We started by getting to understand the concept of "Courageous Advocacy" and its relevance to successful Social Action. Primaries paired up with secondaries to research four different themes where social action could have a real impact on both the school and local communities. The themes were: Community, Conservation, Environment and Health. Each group researched problems linked to their designated theme in their school/community, existing action groups and charities, then considered what actions might be a starting point for the TrustEd Parliament to work on.

Each group presented their findings, and we ended the day with a vote on which cause the Student Parliament would focus their action during 2024-25. The theme was 'Waste Disposal & Recycling'. All felt that this would be a cause that schools will be able to have the biggest impact.
